A Blade of Grass Announces Partnership with ALL ARTS to Release Series of Films Focused on Work of Socially Engaged Artists

Program to Launch on July 27, with the Premiere of Artist Jordan Weber's Film on His Project with the Malcolm X Memorial Foundation
And an Instagram Live Discussion Hosted by A Blade of Grass

New York—July 22, 2020—A Blade of Grass, the national nonprofit focused on socially engaged art, announced today its partnership with ALL ARTS, an online arts and culture platform created by WNET, to release a series of films about artists working toward social, political, and cultural transformation. The A Blade of Grass Films, which are five to ten minutes in length were co-produced with RAVA Films between 2015 and 2019 as part of A Blade of Grass's Fellowship for Socially Engaged Art. Several of the films have never been shown publicly and many others have been available in only limited circulation. The partnership provides a new opportunity for audiences to learn about the beauty, rigor, and impact of artists working collaboratively in communities to address critical issues such as gentrification, environmental racism, mass incarceration, cultural preservation, and the creation of more BIPOC-led institutions. In total, A Blade of Glass will release 16 films from its archives on ALL ARTS, including the premieres for artists Jordon Weber, Gregory Sale, Miguel Luciano, and Frances Whitehead.

The first film will be released on July 27 and explores Jordan Weber's 4MXGreenhouse, an architectural and experiential artwork that gives physical form to the four "pillars" the artist identifies with Malcolm X and community health: self-empowerment and determination; soil and air cleansing on superfund sites; spiritual reflection and meditation; and medicinal and food supply. Developed in collaboration with the Malcolm X Memorial Foundation, Weber created a greenhouse based on the design of the home that Malcolm X was born in, which originally stood where the foundation is located in North Omaha, Nebraska. The once rural area has, in the years since, been heavily polluted by industry, and the neighborhood is impacted by a long history of poverty and social and economic challenges defined by environmental racism and food desertification. The greenhouse produced food crops and served as a site of spiritual practice and other community-based programming.

To support further engagement with the film, project, and Weber's practice more broadly, A Blade of Grass will host an Instagram LIVE conversation with Weber and JoAnna LeFlore, a board member from the Malcolm X Memorial Foundation on July 27, at 5:00 PM EST. The discussion will be available at @abladeofgrassorg.

Additional films will be released on a weekly basis and will live on a dedicated A Blade of Grass Films page on ALL ARTS, with films clustered into four thematic categories that broadly define the featured artists' work: Black Self-Determination; Criminal Justice; Cultural Identity; and Alternative Futures. The films will also be broadcast on WNET, and further promoted across the ALL ARTS and A Blade of Grass social media channels. The roster of films and release dates follows below:
